Year 8 pupils have been learning about different types of plastics and their properties. They are presently forming thermoplastics and designing and making a monster Pod shape.





Abbey Hill is a gold award wining school.




PSHE, Careers and Enterprise

Healthy School Accreditation

Abbey Hill Academy is officially a Healthy School!

On 26th November 2024 we had our Healthy School accreditation visit from Eve Connor McGill (Health Education and Relationship manager) and some other key members from Stockton on Tees Local Authority. The visitors were given a very warm welcome by students from both the Stephenson and Walker buildings and soon got into the Abbey Hill spirit by being asked to perform the Can–Can within their first 10 minutes on site!

The aim of the visit, was to see if their was evidence that were looking to see if Abbey Hill Academy had met the criteria for the award which has an enhanced single focus on health, well-being and resilience. The framework is aligned to a "whole school approach" model that includes links to the teaching, curriculum and learning, pupil voice and support for staff well-being.

The aim of the Healthy Schools Toolkit is to provide benchmarks for excellence and is aligned to the OFSTED criteria. It covers four key components. The first two, nutrition and oral health and physical activity are stand-alone criteria. The last two components, resilience and social, emotional health and well-being are judged on how well our broad and balanced curriculum inspires pupils to learn, promotes resilience and supports social and emotional learning.

The evidence we submitted, alongside staff contributions and pupil voice gained during their visit, was taken to panel the next day, and we were thrilled to discover that we had been successful and we are now one of the 16 Healthy School accredited provisions across Stockton on Tees.

Communication at Abbey Hill

Athis term we have started a new lunchtime club: Chatty Tuesdays! This is a club for Talker users to get together with others who communicate in the same way. Talkers are usually Ipads or tablets with specialist communication software. The software can be operated in different ways, depending on the needs of the child e.g. touch or eye gaze tracking.

At Chatty Tuesdays, we play games, draw, and have a good old chat using our Talkers!

We have also benefitted from the kind donation of trial Talker software for three of our Ipads, from communication software companies Smartbox UK and Tobii Dynavox. This enables us to try out Talkers with more children, to see whether referral for their own device might be helpful.

The majority of parents/carers of students in the semi-formal and informal curricular have agreed to be involved and have received an email confirming their account details.


We look forward to using this app to develop parental engagement in learning further and encourage parents & carers to contact school if they have any questions. Feedback is greatly appreciated.
