



At Abbey Hill Academy keeping pupils and staff safe is very important.

What is this?

To keep everybody safe at School, we have lots of training and 'policies' to help us. (Policies are documents with rules in them that staff have to follow to make sure we are doing everything right)

This is a 'child friendly' version of our safeguarding policies designed for our students and should be read as a guide to the main 'child protection' policy as well the other policies we have.

How do we keep Pupils safe?

As well as having Policies, at Abbey Hill Academy we try and keep students safe by doing lots of different things...

- We help children to learn how to keep themselves safe online and in the real world.
- We try to provide a safe environment for children to learn in. We do this
 by helping children to recognise when they need support from staff to
 keep themselves and people around them safe.
- We also have lots of other things in School that can help us to keep Abbey Hill Academy a 'safe place'....



• The Incredible 5 point scale



The 'Incredible 5-point scale' helps students to understand the types of feelings they may be having and helps them to use words, colours or numbers to tell staff if they need help to manage their emotions or are worried about things.

• Zones of Regulation



This is a special system that we have for some students in Abbey Hill Academy to help students understand different types of self- regulation and emotional control. Not being able to manage how we are feeling may lead to them hurting themselves or to others being hurt or unsafe.



• Worry Box

Sometimes students can struggle to talk about their worries, at Abbey Hill Academy, we have 'worry boxes' at the Reception Desk of each building and worries can be written down and posted in the worry box. The worry boxes are checked by safe people in School and they can help children to understand and deal with their worries.



• Toot Toot



If students feel like they can't speak to a 'safe person' face to face or via the worry box, we also encourage them to use Toot Toot. This is a messenger service that can be accessed online or via the Toot Toot App. Students are all given their own username and password and can message at any time of the day or night. They know that these messages are checked regularly by familiar members of staff who will help them deal with their worries or direct them to someone who can



Anti Bullying Ambassadors

We have lots of student
ambassadors in school to help keep
our students safe i.e. Lunchtime
Monitors, Playground Monitors,
House Captains, Rights Respecting
Ambassadors and Anti-Bullying
Ambassadors. Students know that
they can go to them if they need a
peer to speak to.



• Random Acts of Kindness



Students are encouraged to support each other by nominating them for a 'Random Act of Kindness' if they do something nice for them. All the nominations are read out in Assembly and stuck in our special book for everyone to see.



Visitors

At Abbey Hill Academy, any adult who comes into our School has to 'sign in' at reception, then they get given a badge to wear so we all know who they are.



If you see an adult wearing a 'staff' lanyard that means that they are staff members and they work for the Trust.



If you see an adult wearing a green lanyard that means that they are visiting our Academy and our staff have done the checks needed to make sure they are safe to walk around our school alone.



If you see an adult wearing a red lanyard that means that they are visiting our Academy but they need to stay with our staff when walking around the Academy.

If any children see an adult that you don't know without a badge on at Abbey Hill Academy, they must tell their teacher.



Safeguarding Leads

Children can speak to any member of staff if they have any worries or are unhappy about something. Sometimes children's worries are quite big, and teachers might need to get some advice.

We have special staff in School called 'Designated Safeguarding Leads' who work with different people like Parents/Carers, Social Workers and the Police. They make sure that everybody is working together to keep our pupils safe at School and at home

E-Safety

The internet is brilliant, but sometimes things on the internet can be scary and not appropriate for young people.

At Abbey Hill Academy, we have lots of different things in place to help keep our pupils safe online and we have e-safety training for staff and pupils.

Andy Pearson is our 'e-safety lead' and also a CEOPS ambassador and he helps children learn lots of different ways of how to keep themselves safe online.

Our internet has a special 'filtering and monitoring' tools that make sure children can't access anything dangerous whilst using the computers at School.

There are also lots of different websites and tools available to help children to learn how to keep safe online. We have an e-safety policy and an e-safety leaflet for our pupils which explains things in a bit more detail.

Operation Encompass

Operation Encompass is a project that Abbey Hill Academy has with Cleveland Police.

If the Police are called and visit your house because there is fighting and arguing at home or somebody is scared and doesn't feel safe; the Police will tell a 'Key Adult' at School that they have visited your house and what they have done to keep everybody safe.

This information means that the 'key Adults' in School can help you to try and understand what is going on and make sure you're not worried about things whilst you're at School.

PREVENT

'Prevent' is a duty from the government that helps Schools to keep pupils safe from radicalisation and terrorism. This means we have a responsibility to protect our pupils from extremist and violent views the same way we protect them from drugs or gang violence.

Importantly, we can provide a safe place for pupils to discuss these issues so they better understand how to protect themselves.

We do lots of things school to help children become positive, happy members of society and we promote 'British Values' across our School.

What are British values?

- Democracy
- · The rule of law
- Individual liberty
- Mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs

We will also protect you from the risk of radicalisation, for example by using filters on the internet to make sure you can't access extremist and terrorist material, or by vetting visitors who come into school to work with you.
